### SCHOOL CLOSURE UPDATE 4: The End of the Fourth School Week

We hope that all of the Hillcrest children and their families are well.

We are told that we are currently passing through the peak of the virus but without seeing significant drops in the numbers of new infections, it is difficult to see when school can return to normal.

Even if schools are asked to return before the Summer holidays, they will look far from normal and, as the Education Secretary, Gavin Williamson, said this week, there will be a phased return. We are waiting to hear what form that phased return might take.

Although tough and challenging, the role that parents and carers are playing as home schoolers is vital to ensure that, upon their eventual return to school, playing catch up to where the children should be and with where their peers are, is as painless as possible.

On average, children fall half a term behind with their skills, knowledge and understanding after a six-week Summer holiday and do not catch up with where they were in July until around October half-term. Multiply that effect out against the current closure period and you can get a sense of the challenge that lies ahead for the teachers and the pupils.

However, children are also resilient and used to making up lost ground after school holidays and periods of ill health, and therefore, despite the period of time that they will have been away from school, they will catch up, they will move on and school life will return to normal eventually.

We would however, urge parents to ensure that if their child has been relaxed about completing the Google Classrooms work or they have yet to complete many tasks in the paper-based resource packs, that they start to engage more and complete tasks daily. The more they keep up with their learning at home, the easier it will be to slot back in to normal daily school life when they return.







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The importance of reading should also not be underestimated and we have always said that if schools only had to do one thing every day to improve children's life chances as they get older, it would be to allow them to read as much as they can. The same now applies to home. The more reading opportunities you give your children, the better.

### **Residential Trips**

It will come as no surprise that whether we are back at school after half-term or not, the annual Year 6 residential trip to Hilltop will not be going ahead.

All parents who had paid for their children to attend that trip will receive a full refund in due course.

However, in addition to that, we will not be booking a residential trip for our current Year 5 pupils next year. The uncertainty around the length of time that social distancing measures will need to be in place as the search for a vaccine goes on, combined with the complications around the insurance issues that we have had over the past few weeks as decisions about who is liable for the repayments to parents has taken place, means that it would be reckless to book another trip at this time, even though it is over a year away.

However, even if a residential trip for next year's Year 6s isn't a possibility, we will still look to provide them with a week of activities, which will hopefully be able to include day trips by then, so that there is a positive end to the year in prospect.

### **Year 6 Leavers**

The current school closure has hit many families hard with children, parents and teachers all getting to grips with online teaching and Google Classrooms in particular.

However, please spare a thought for the Year 6s who have possibly been hit hardest by the current situation.

Although they haven't had to go through their SATs exams, which for some would have still been preferable to the current lockdown and an opportunity to show-off their knowledge, skills and understanding, by now they would have been preparing for the Hilltop residential trip and engaging in transition work with their future High School.







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Although school returning in June isn't a prospect that everyone would relish, for the Year 6 pupils, it would provide an ideal opportunity to engage in some of those activities that would prepare them for life at Downham Market Academy, Iceni Academy, or wherever else our pupils may be moving on to. Hopefully the High Schools are keeping in touch directly with the parents of Year 6 pupils about their plans in the event that we either do or don't return to school before the Summer.

The Summer Term usually provides a pleasant opportunity for the children and the staff to celebrate the successes of the children before they move on with the culmination being their Leavers Assembly in front of their parents.

We have a range of options planned for the Year 6s which again depend entirely on whether we see them again before the Summer holidays or not. If school does not reopen we will ensure that the children still get their Leavers Yearbook, gifts (of some description) and there will be the usual array of awards. Even if school does return after half-term, it will not be possible to hold a traditional Leavers Assembly due to the restrictions around social distancing. However, we are looking at the options around holding an outdoor ceremony where we may be able to social distance everyone or, indeed, a virtual ceremony that is streamed to the homes of the Year 6 parents.

Strange times require unusual solutions.

### **Paper-Based Resources**

Despite the success of Google Classrooms, the paper-based resources have also proven popular and we plan to distribute one final round of these after the forthcoming VE Day Bank Holiday.

Therefore, if you would like your child to receive these in addition to the work they are doing online, please email <u>office@hillcrest.norfolk.sch.uk</u> by 1pm on Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> May so that we can start printing them off.

You have three options...

1) If you have a printer at home and are happy printing these yourself, we can email the file(s) to you;







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2) If you would like them to be posted out to you because you do not live close to the school or you are self-isolating because you are displaying symptoms, please let us know:

3) You can collect the paper-based resources from the fire exit to the main school hall on Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> May

I would like to reassure parents that the staggered collection times that we had for the packs on the last occasion worked really well and prevented large queues of people forming.

When emailing us, please make sure you tell us the names of your children and the year groups they are in. This helps to speed up the process for the people receiving the emails and creating the log.

Those collecting will be asked to place a tick beside their child's name after taking a pack so that we know who has and hasn't collected.

We will provide pens to do this along with an alcohol gel dispenser. However, should you wish to bring your own pen then please do. We would also ask that parents do not come on to site if they are displaying the main Covid-19 symptoms of continuous cough and fever and that if there is a queue for the packs that the, now familiar, social distancing rules are observed.

Parents of children in Reception and Year 1 should come along on Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> May between 10.00 and 10.30. Those in Years 2 and 3 between 10.30 and 11.15 whilst those with children in Years 4, 5 & 6 should drop by between 11.15 and 12.00.
