## SCHOOL CLOSURE UPDATE 15: Final School Closure Update

School has already closed to the pupils in Suns and Nebulas classes this week with the final day for those in Asteroids, Meteors and the Year 6 bubbles, being Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> July.

After the Summer holidays Hillcrest will reopen to all pupils across the school on Monday 7<sup>th</sup> September. The first School Closure Update was emailed on 27<sup>th</sup> March and this 15<sup>th</sup> edition will be the final one with the old-style newsletters returning monthly from September.

Of course, the key information within this edition is the list of start and finish times for each class from 7<sup>th</sup> September. I am sure there has been much anticipation, especially for those parents with more than one child at Hillcrest who will be hoping that the start and finish times fall nicely for them.

As we have reported previously, the task of staggering the start and finish for 18 classes and over 500 children has not been an easy one. With so many siblings scattered across the school, the new timetable is undoubtedly going to be inconvenient for many, requiring some parents to drop children off, return home and collect another for a re-run. We would like to thank those parents of children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 6 who have adapted well to the one-way system around school and managed the stagger since returning on 1<sup>st</sup> June. There will be a similar process in place throughout the Autumn Term, and possibly beyond, but on a much larger scale as it will involve far more people.

We would ask that parents do not request amendments to the timetable or send in requests to accept some children into school early, as these requests simply cannot be met. The staggered timetable has only been necessary because of the extraordinary circumstances in which we find ourselves and it is not as simple as making one adaption to the programme for one family. Like an incredibly large jigsaw puzzle, one piece moved has huge consequences for the entire plan. Therefore, we ask that parents persevere with the schedule, even if it is not ideal for all.









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### The Timetable for September

Below is a list of the start and finish times for each class along with the timing of their lunch break so that you can get a sense of how early or late in the day they will be eating.

It is important for the success of the stagger that parents are as prompt as possible when dropping off and picking up to prevent people either gathering on the playground because they are too early and mixing with parents in the previous time slot or arriving too late and mixing with those in the later time slot.

Please be aware that some classes are eating lunch extremely early, with the first lunch break taking place between 10.25 and 11.25am whilst others will not eat until 1.05 – 2.05pm. However, generally it is those classes arriving the earliest in the morning who will be having the earliest lunch.

Despite the stagger, all classes will receive the same amount of learning time as normal.







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## **Morning (or Afternoon) Break Snacks**

With potentially long mornings (or afternoons) for some, parents may wish to provide their children with additional snacks for break times.

Some classes will find that their traditional morning break is swapped for an afternoon one where the positioning of lunch means that their morning is cut short. The children will be allowed to save their snack for the afternoon break if this is the case.

We will continue to maintain the healthy standards of these snacks and continue to follow the healthy snack policy was adopted at Hillcrest several years ago.

It is especially important at these times that the children's health, including dental health, is taken extra care of and at a time when we are suggesting that additional snacks may be necessary, it becomes even more important that healthy choices are made.

## **Book Amnesty – WE NEED YOUR HELP!**

Despite requesting the return of Communication Books, library books and set reading books on the Transition Days, we received very few books.

We are in danger of having a huge hole in the school's reading resources in the new year if we do not get all school books returned before the term ends next Tuesday.

So that the reading books and library books can be available for other pupils from September, can parents please dig out any books they may have and return them to school by placing them in the boxes situated outside the main front entrance on Monday or Tuesday of next week.

If the books do not come back after being loaned out, it will also make loaning books out difficult in the event that we are forced to close again in the future because of further lockdowns.

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#### **Year 6 Leavers Assembly**

Provided that the technology works in our favour, our plan is to stream the Year 6 Leavers Assembly live to the parents at home via the Facebook page set up by the school at the start of the lockdown so that we could share stories with the children. The ceremony will begin at 10am on Monday 20<sup>th</sup> July and will last approximately 30 minutes.

All aspects of normal school life have been affected by the pandemic and the Year 6s end to their Hillcrest experience is no different. Whilst incredibly sad that they cannot share this moment with their parents watching close by as Year 6s in years gone past would have done, this at least will allow the children to share the moment with one another and in the knowledge that their parents can still watch, even if it is from the comfort of their home or workplace.

The vast majority of Year 6 pupils have now returned to school and it would be great to see ALL of the pupils back for this day in particular. Therefore, provided you feel happy with your child attending school on that day, we would ask that, if possible, all Year 6 pupils return for that ceremony.

## **Year 6 Shirt and Book Signing**

Some other end of school traditions have been affected by the safety measures in place because of the coronavirus.

The Year 6 pupils will be unable to mingle with one another to get their shirts signed as they may have done in past years.

Instead, the children of those parents who are happy for their children to get their shirt signed, can get those children within their 'bubble' to sign their shirt but not other Year 6 children from outside their bubble.

If parents wish to provide their children with an autograph book, we are arranging for those to be passed to each bubble for all of the children to sign. However, it will be the staff passing the books from bubble to bubble and not the children.







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## **Non-School Uniform Day**

Children within Meteors and the Year 6 classes are welcome to come to school on their final day, Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> July, in non-school uniform.

### **Keeping in Touch with Learning over the Summer**

Some parents, and children, believe that after almost a year of learning, that the Summer holidays are a time to switch off from formal learning and have the break that everyone deserves.

Schools have spoken for years about the fact that the six-week break results in a dip in learning which the average child doesn't catch up on until the October half-term.

Of course, it is even more important this Summer that children continue to access some form of learning either through workbooks that are readily available through high street stores or through online retailers such as Amazon, or through the use of online educational resources. Many children will not have received any formal learning for over 5 months by the time they return in September and if you are concerned that your child hasn't engaged with Google Classrooms as much as they should have done, it is even more important that some time is taken during the Summer holidays to immerse the children in some form of learning.

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### Attendance Compulsory from September

A reminder that the government expectation, and therefore the school's expectations, is that all children return as normal on Monday 7<sup>th</sup> September.

Attendance is once again compulsory after this temporary period of optional attendance and the usual process of fining parents of poorly attending pupils is reintroduced.

### **One Way System**

A one-way system around the school site will remain in place when we return in September.

Unlike the current time where the front gate is the only point of access, we will be reopening the back gate onto Civray Avenue from 7<sup>th</sup> September. However, the gate leading onto Sandringham Drive will remain closed until social distancing is no longer required.

For those accessing the school via the front gate, the one way system that has been in place since 1<sup>st</sup> June will remain in place with parents walking anti-clockwise around the school building until they reach their child's classroom and then continuing anti-clockwise around the school until they head past the Reception classrooms and out of the car park.

For those accessing the site via Civray Avenue, this gate will be both an entrance and an exit. However, you will head onto the school site via the tarmac path and leave the school site via the grass path that will be marked out beside it. It is then for parents to take turns and wait at the gate to avoid squeezing through when parents may be coming the other way.

The closure of the school office will continue into the new school year, as will the postponement of face-to-face meetings between parents and staff. However, as time goes by and the situation continues to improve, communication will be one of the first matters addressed so that we can start to invite people into the school building again.
